Event Descriptions

Public Address

Persuasive Speaking: An original speech by the student designed to inspire, reinforce, or change the beliefs, attitudes, values or actions of the audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

Informative Speaking: An original, factual speech by the student on a realist subject to fulfill the general aim to inform the audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time is 10 minutes.

Communication Analysis: An original speech by the student designed to offer an explanation and/or evaluation of a communication event such as a speech, speaker, movement, poem, poster, film, campaign, etc., through the use of rhetorical principles. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforce the message. Manuscripts are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

After Dinner Speaking: An original, humorous speech by the student, designed to exhibit sound speech composition, thematic, coherence, direct communicative public speaking skills, and good taste. The speech should not resemble a night club act, an impersonation, or comic dialogue. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used to supplement and reinforced the message. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

Limited Preparation

Extemporaneous Speaking: Contestants will be given three topics in the area of current events, choose one, and have 30 minutes to prepare a speech that is the original work of the student. One round each will be devoted to the areas of domestic, economic, and international topics. Maximum time limit for the speech is 7 minutes. Limited notes are permitted. Internet usage during prep time is allowed. While FSCJ will make an effort to provide reliable Internet access to competitors, we cannot guarantee it. Competitors are strongly urged to come to the

tournament with well-researched, offline files and/or connectivity devices of their own.

Impromptu Speaking: An impromptu speech, substantive in nature, with topic selections varied by round and by section. Topics will be derived from quotations. Speakers will have a total of 7 minutes for both preparation and speaking. Timing commences with the acceptance of the prompt. Limited notes are permitted. Topics will be quotations for the first round, cartoons for the second round, and objects for the third round. Final round topic will be a rhetorical situation.

Interpretation of Literature

Poetry Interpretation: A selection or selections of poetry of literary merit, which may be drawn from more than one source. A primary focus of this event should be on the development of language. Play cuttings and prose works are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

Prose Interpretation: An original or selections of prose material of literary merit, which may be

drawn from more than one source. Focus of this event is on the development of the narrative/story. Play cuttings and poetry are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time is 10 minutes including introduction.

Dramatic Interpretation: A cutting that represents one or more characters from a play or plays of literary merit. The focus of this event is on the development of characterization. This material may be drawn from stage, screen, or radio. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

Duo Interpretation: A cutting from one or more texts of literary merit, humorous or serious, involving the portrayal of two or more characters presented by two individuals. The material may be drawn from any genre of literature. This is not an acting event; thus, no costumes, props, lighting, etc, are to be used. Presentation is from the manuscript and the focus should be off-stage and not to each other. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

Program Oral Interpretation: A program of thematically-linked selections of literary merit, chosen from two or three recognized genres of competitive interpretation (prose/poetry/drama). A primary focus of this event should be on the development of the theme through the use of narrative/story, language, and/or characterization. A substantial portion of the total time must be devoted to each of the genres used in the program. Different genre means the material must appear in separate pieces of literature (e.g., A poem included in a short story that appears only in that short story does not constitute a poetry genre.) Only one selection may be original. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

Readers Theatre

Phi Rho Pi guidelines will be in effect. Maximum presentation time is 25 minutes. Schools are limited to two readers theatre entries. Readers theatre will not count toward pentathlon.

Rules

- Competitors may not quadruple enter in any flight.
- An individual(s) may not use prepared material from competition prior to the 2019-2020 school year.
- Penalties for overtime are ultimately at the judge's discretion, but no grace period for overtime is sanctioned by this tournament.
- Pentathlon will require one interpretation event, one public address event, one limited preparation event, and any two other events (readers theatre not included).
- Extemporaneous questions will be taken from periodicals from Sept 1, 2019 or later.
- If any conflict occurs in tournament procedure, decisions will be the responsibility of the tournament director.
- A novice is considered any competitor in her or his first term (semester) of college competition.
- Schools are limited to 8 entries per individual event and 2 entries for Readers Theatre.
- Individual events with over 50 entries will go to semifinals or as our judging pool allows.

- Host school participants will be eligible for individual events awards but will not be eligible for any team sweepstakes awards.
- Ties in individual events will be broken on combined ranks, then combined rates, then judges' preference.

Cash Awards - In Memoriam

The Samuel Jackson Pentathlon Award - \$200

This scholarship honors Florida State College's second forensics coach, Samuel Jackson, who was a hallmark of friendship and learning during his tenure at (what was then) FCCJ.

The Richard O'Bryant After Dinner Speaking Award - \$100

This award honors Florida State College forensics competitor, Richard O'Bryant, whose incredible wit and compassion always made us smile.

The Norm Will Poetry Interpretation Award - \$100

This award honors Dr. Will, who was president of South Campus and an ardent supporter of intercollegiate forensics at our college year after year.
